COBURN PLACE DOMESTIC VIOLENCE TRANSITIONAL HOUSING MODEL

Low barrier entry into program Voluntary services Clients may receive all Coburn Place services before, during, and after their stay in TH Survivors can stay up to 24 months Clients receive help from housing wellbeing advocates No rent is required during stay

clients do not have to pay rent while in the program



using flexible funds to help reduce housing barriers



large, committed volunteer force



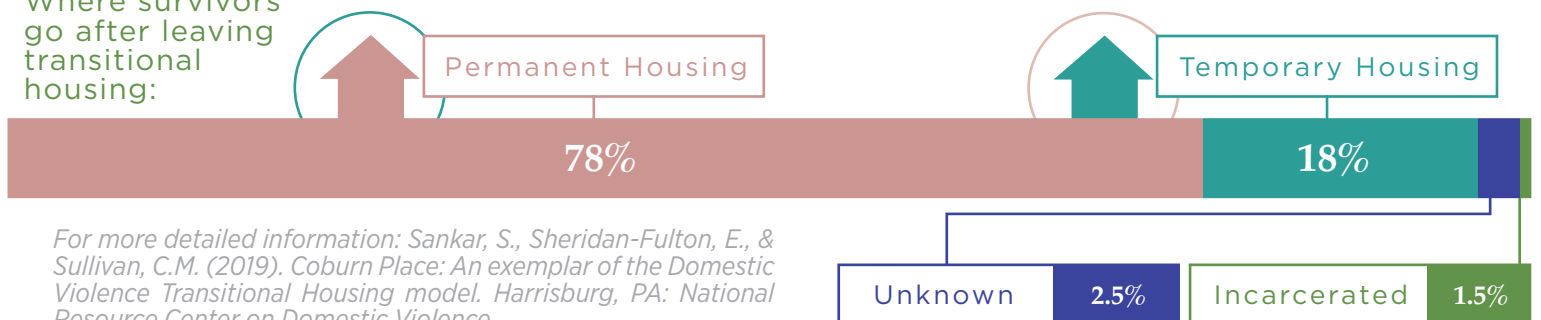
staff include housing advocates and wellbeing advocates
